Feds Ok 696, Fight Still on

Official sources indicated today that Pleasant Ridge and the Ferndale School District will continue their opposition to the proposed 10-Mile Route of I-696 in spite of Federal approval given yesterday.

Ridge City Manager William Lange said he expects the City Commission to stand firm in its long-time fight against the route.

He reiterated that the Ridge would carry its opposition into the courts, if necessary.

John J. Houghton, Ferndale school superintendent, said: "I'm disappointed the Federal government is approving this. However, I don't feel the matter is settled."

"The School Board's position, taken last October, has not been changed by this announcement."

Houghton said the School District, which includes the Ridge and portions of Oak Park, stands to lose about \$58,000 per year from decreased valuation of property taken for the highway.

PLEASANT RIDGE officials contend that the 10-Mile route would mean the loss of 380 residents, a sales tax loss of \$3,329 per year and 10.6 percent of the city's annual valuation, equalling \$1,424,685.

One official in Pleasant Ridge said, "The State Highway Department now has another club (the Federal approval) it can use in its attempts to force us to give in."

The source added, "The Highway Department can also go to individuals now and offer to buy up property along 10 Mile, which it couldn't do before without Federal approval."

"And quite a few residents on 10 Mile might want to get rid of their homes. There have been very few sold there in the past few years."

Route approval by the U.S. Bureau of Public Roads followed submission of the State Highway Department's recommendation and a transcript of a public hearing conducted at Ferndale High in early October.

State Highway Director Howard E. Hill said: "I do not interpret the Bureau action as meaning we can proceed to acquire right of way and build the route without the approval of the governing bodies of the communities involved."

"We will continue to negotiate with both the Bureau and the local communities in an effort to finalize agreements that will enable us to build this much-needed freeway."

"We have endeavored for months to cooperate with those affected and we will continue to do so."

APPROVAL of the route location covers the segment of I-696 from its intersection with Northwestern Highway near Lahser Road through Southfield, Oak Park, Pleasant Ridge, Royal Oak, Hazel Park and Madison Heights to just east of the New York Central Railroad tracks near 11 Mile in Warren.

The Bureau previously had approved the location recommended by the State Highway Department for the section east of the NYCCR east to the interchange with I-94 in St. Clair Shores.

Objections to the proposed route location have also been voiced by leaders in Southfield and Oak Park.

While a student at the University of Michigan taking a master's degree in history, he was invited to organize Lincoln High School and become its first principal.

In 1920, he administered classes held in various buildings on Nine Mile and Woodward (assemblies were held in a dance hall) until the school was completed.

After four years, during which he worked toward a law degree at the Detroit College of Law, he resigned to open his law office here.

AS A PRACTICING attorney, Cole has watched the city grow and has aided its development by serving as a charter member and officer of many community betterment organizations.

He was a member of the original library board and the first recreation advisory board. For 10 years or more, he served on the Community Building Association, was its first president.

The Chamber of Commerce can also claim him a past-president.

So does the Exchange Club. A charter member, Cole fulfilled numerous offices, in-

cluding secretary and president of the state organization.

As the first Commander of Paul W. Hornaday post 1407 VFW in Ferndale, the World War I veteran went on to become state commander.

The former assistant prosecuting attorney has been a Circuit Court commissioner since 1939 and has served as attorney for many municipalities, including Ferndale, and the Ferndale School Board.

Presently a ruling elder of the Royal Oak Presbyterian Church, he has served his church in many capacities. He recently wrote its history, "The First 50 Years."

In addition, the board of trustees for Presbyterian Village and Alma College list him as a member.

His personal philosophy of community involvement has not gone unrecognized. In 1958, the Exchange Club name him Ferndale's number-one citizen with its Golden Deeds Award. Lawyer—teacher—soldier—citi-

zen, he is Ferndale's goodwill ambassador.

His acclaim is state-wide. In 1964, he was elected to the Detroit chapter, National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame and received the Willy Heston football award.

His published works are a natural outgrowth of an interest in history and stamp collecting. The two combined into collecting Michigan postal markings and resulted in several books.

ALL HIS WRITINGS are correct and annotated. The Burton Historical collections, copies of the old Royal Oak Tribune and the Oakland Gazette are used to verify details.

The author himself is considered an authority on matters historical and his accuracy and integrity are unchallenged.

Admittedly, we may have omitted some important details in Cole's varied career, but we have tried to present him as a leading citizen who contributes to the Ferndale of today and records the Ferndale of yesteryear.

1965-Year of Awakening

For Ferndale, this has been the Year of Awakening.

It started quite slowly, with a silent, uncontested campaign for a mayor and two commissioners, although the race for municipal judge was warm.

Youth and new ideas came to the fore with the spring election of Judge Montague R. Hunt, and the hiring of a 29-year-old city manager, J. William Little, and a 23-year-old recreation director, Roger Kowalski.

Also hired, later in the year, was an urban renewal director, Roy Strasser.

A race for one of two School Board posts brought a little liveliness to the community, as Mrs. William R. Jenkins received a close-vote nod for the one-year term.

In another close election, voters approved 11 mills and a six mill increase for school operation for five years.

But again, the vote was light and the community was silent on open discussion of real issues.

During the first 11 months of 1965, about the only residents who really spoke out in public were those living in the proposed urban renewal area.

During two informal public hearings in May-June, the City Commission chambers were packed and, except for a few, affected residents made a pitch to remain in their old homesteads.

There were only two other times this year that crowds were seen in the city hall, when the new building was dedicated in April and during presentation of the "master plan" in December.

Otherwise, just the "old regulars" and sometimes one, attended most of the city meetings. The same situation prevailed during most School Board meetings.

BUT THE COMMUNITY was beginning its morning stretch after a long sleep and some eyelids were beginning to rise.

Throughout the summer and early fall, Plan Commissioners and city officials were preparing a new zoning ordinance and 25-year "master plan."

Some citizen reaction in this Year of Awakening came as a result of the continuous Ferndale Gazette-Times coverage of Plan Commission studies.

Finally, on Dec. 2, the Gazette-Times was able to announce the formation of the East Ferndale Home Owners Association, which stated a policy of community beautification and improvement.

There also seem to be plans in the works to form a few similar associations on the west side.

As with the residents of the renewal study area, some of these citizens understandably felt very emotional in the fear of being "driven" from their homes.

But also they began to fear the further-reaching possibility that their community might, for the sake of "progress" and master planning alone, lose its stable, home-owner basis and its "hometown atmosphere."

Citizens are now beginning to discuss the basic issues involved in city planning; they are starting to explore the changes suggested.

If this mood continues through the coming year, it might be possible to call 1966 the Year of Exploration.

'Progressive Retailing' Sparks Business Boom

Ferndale business continued its strong economic climb during the past 12 months. Year's end found local sales hitting the cash register bells to the tune of thousands of dollars in profits.

Part of this vigorous increase, according to Forrest B. Bradley, manager of the Chamber of Commerce, is due to "progressive retailing by our merchants."

Bradley defined the term as "giving the public exactly what it wishes to buy, at

prices competitive with other shopping centers."

Of a representative group of shoppers contacted during the Christmas "rush," 43 were from Ferndale, 8 from Oak Park, 8 from Detroit, 3 from Pleasant Ridge, 3 from Royal Oak, 2 from Taylor, 2 from Warren, with 1 each from Madison Heights, Coldwater, Troy, Clawson and Lathrup.

Among the reasons given by these customers for spending their dollars in Ferndale were convenience, good selection of merchandise, friendly atmosphere, fair prices, good parking facilities and dependable merchants.

One group of extremely satisfied shoppers lumped all categories into the glowing accolade, "We just like to shop in Ferndale."

COMMENTS from local business folk reflected the rainbow hues of the Chamber of Commerce report.

Peg Williams, manager of the local R.B. Women's Wear Shop told the Gazette-Times, "We've certainly had more customers than last year."

John Howard, S.S. Kresge manager, said, "Business has certainly been fine."

Dave Needham of A-D Camera Outlet, reported that he had "a sell-out on many popular items."

While some merchants, especially local "booteries," decried the lack of snow—even they were certain business as a whole had been "very good."

Bradley had the last word in the overall business survey:

"There's no doubt but that it was an extremely good year for all our business people—but they can't rest on their oars. They've got to continue the courteous, 'small town' manner of dealing with the public, in order to compete actively with the other shopping centers."

Bradley feels that, if this blue print for success is followed, "there should be no reason at all, economic conditions prevailing, that the year of '66 won't be bigger and better than ever."

Two Trains to Continue

Two commuter trains scheduled to be dropped Saturday will continue until further notice.

The Interstate Commerce Commission (ICC) has ordered Grand Trunk Western Railroad officials to continue passenger service on its present schedule.

Previously, the railroad had announced that two early morning trains were to be discontinued and two others re-scheduled.

The railroad has been attempting to curtail its service because of the financial burden imposed in the operation of these trains.

Dropping the overnight trains was forbidden by the Michigan Public Service Commission early last year. An ICC examiner upheld this conclusion.

Then the three-member finance division of the ICC reversed the recommendation. This action was set aside.

The ICC notified both the railroad and Michigan Atty. Gen. Frank J. Kelley of its order.

Last week Kelley, acting on behalf of the Michigan Public Service Commission, filed a petition for review by the full commission.

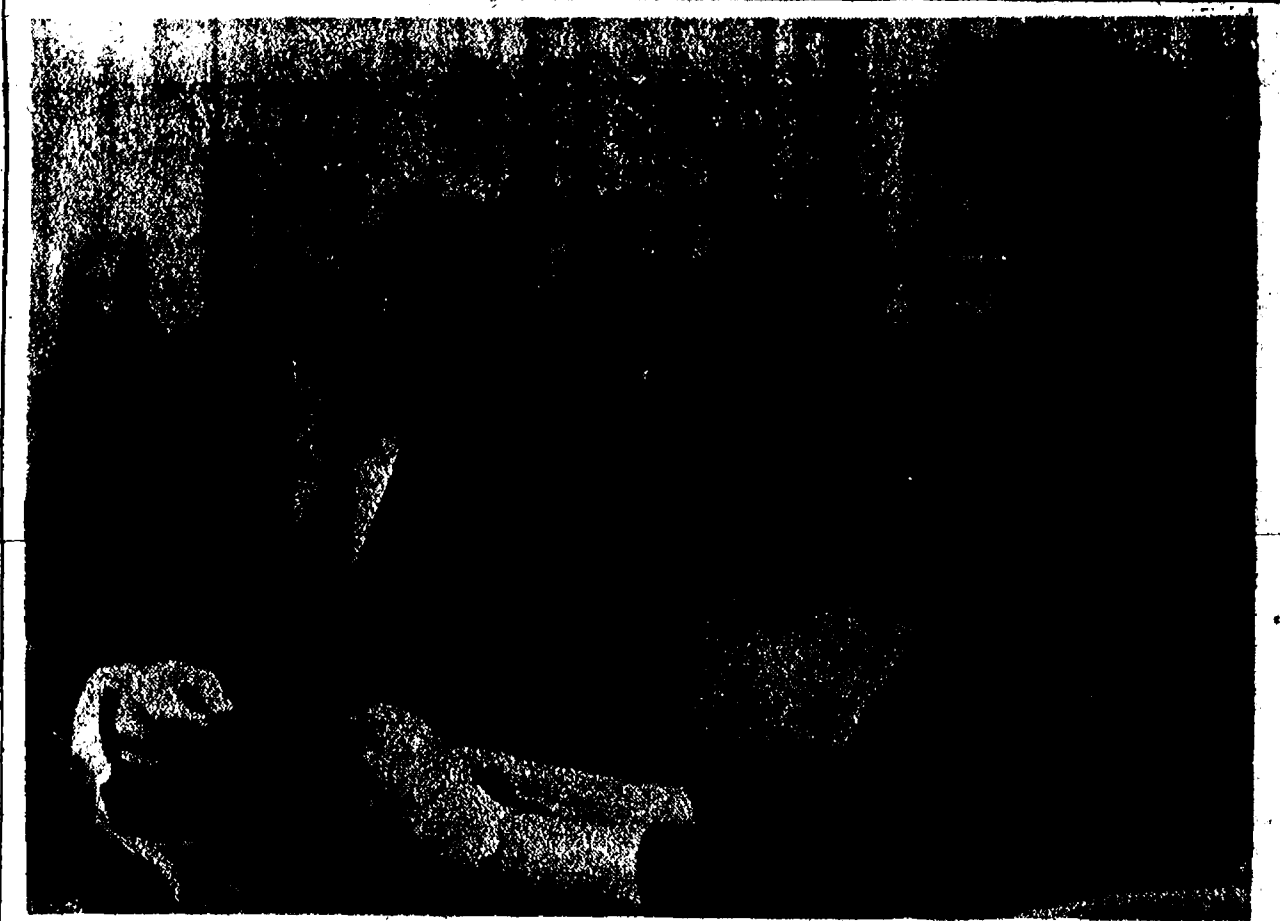
NDEA Grant is Approved for Schools

A federal grant of \$10,288 has been approved for the Ferndale School District under the National Defense Education Act.

The local district will pay 48.9 percent of the cost of this school year's program, or \$9,845.

The matching grant permits purchase of equipment in the areas of science, mathematics, language, civics, history, geography, English and reading.

When the Education Act was passed in 1958, school districts were permitted funds only in the fields of science, math and language.

It all began last summer as the new Recreation Advisory Board began to question the needs of the senior citizens.

A meeting, attended by about 40 persons, was held Sept. 22 in the Ferndale Community Building.

OUTLINING the purpose of the meeting, Roger Kowalski, recreation director asked whether there was a void in senior citizens' programs within the community.

He said the newly formed City Recreation Department was prepared to undertake some type of program if a need did exist.

At the same meeting, Mrs. Alice McFadden, director of senior citizen activities in Ypsilanti, presented a movie

covering the programs there.

There is a full full-time operation with many groups meeting at different times.

A Senior Citizens' Center acts as a focal point and the seniors, along with the rest of the community, literally

LJH Auditorium to be Renovated

The auditorium at Lincoln Junior High School will be completely remodeled within the next month to provide facilities for the Ferndale School District's new remedial reading and language arts program.

General contractors bids are to be opened at the School Board's regular meeting next Wednesday and reconstruction is to begin almost immediately afterward.

"Yes, it is a rush job," agreed Robert D. Christiana, assistant superintendent. Work must be completed by Feb. 1.

OF \$181,050 in federal money coming to the School District under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, Christiana said \$20,000 has been allocated for the auditorium reconstruction.

We hope the cost will be lower," he added. About 400 auditorium seats will be pulled out and the 45x60 foot space will be partitioned into one large and two small rooms.

The larger room will house 20 study carrels, booths equipped with tape recorders and other audio-visual aids for self-instruction as at Oakland Community College.

The room will be carpeted to deaden the sound. A folding partition will run across the middle.

ONE OF the two smaller rooms will house a material storage center, the other will be used as a workroom with office space for teachers, said Christiana.

A dropped ceiling acoustical tile will be used in all three rooms.

The stage area may eventually become an audio-visual center, but this would be done through local funds. "The School Board will not make a decision on this until members find out how much it will cost," said Christiana.

Under the same Federal grant, \$2,700 has been allocated for a sound deadening floor covering in one existing room at Ferndale High to be used in a manner similar to the new rooms at the Junior High.

Bids have not yet been advertised on this portion of the project.

An Activities Board volunteered to act as a steering committee. A calendar of events for November and December was approved. A phone committee was set up and the organization became a helping concern.

HELPING direct activities is Mary Margaret McConnell, recreation supervisor.

The twice-monthly programs now begin at 10:30 a.m., providing time for games and visiting prior to the regular business meeting around noon, at the Community Building.

In an informal, relaxed atmosphere, the seniors can kibitz over cards and checkers and shuffleboard, or just plain sit and talk.

A donation of 35 cents is requested to help defray expenses of the program. Making a day of it, most participants stay around until about 3:30 p.m.

The Activities Board consists of Chairman Christian Peterson, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Moyer, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Harris, Mrs. Olive Smith, Mr. and Mrs. D. S. Proffger, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Koppelman.

This Board has formulated work plans for the organization. Members have accepted chairmanships on visitation, phone, planning and membership committees.

Each member is a recruiter, continually bringing new persons into the organization. Fifty or more were in attendance at the last few meetings.

WITH SUCH a growing project, the Recreation Department hopes to be able to reach out to more of the city's senior citizen population, thereby developing a broad program of interests, including handicrafts, movies, speakers, trips and services.





Coach Shada Receives Highest Kiwanis Award

This is the citation presented to John Shada last week. It continues:

"This award comes to you with the sincere respect and admiration of your peers, who see in your magnificent personal service the embodiment of all that is good in Kiwanis and its programs."

"Done as a dramatic part of the Golden Anniversary activity of this club and of Kiwanis International in the year of 1965. Truly, you are one deserving of that highest of all commendations—He served above and beyond the call of duty."

ACCORDING to Joe LaBelle, Kiwanis second vice-president, this golden service award was not lightly presented. Only two awards are being made in Ferndale to commemorate Kiwanis 50 years of community service.

The first was given to former city manager Fred Laking when he retired. The club's board of directors, knowing many of John's behind-the-scenes activities, recommended him to International for approval.

"It's good to win but we need to be real champs off the field as well as on. We represent our family, our school, our church, our community."

The respect shared by teacher and pupil, coach and player, is often manifest later when former students return to visit "Mr. Shada".

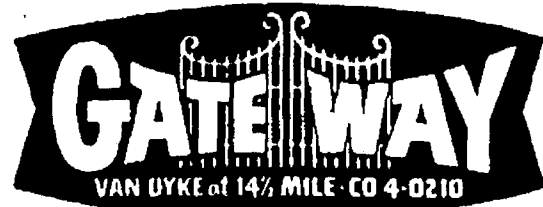

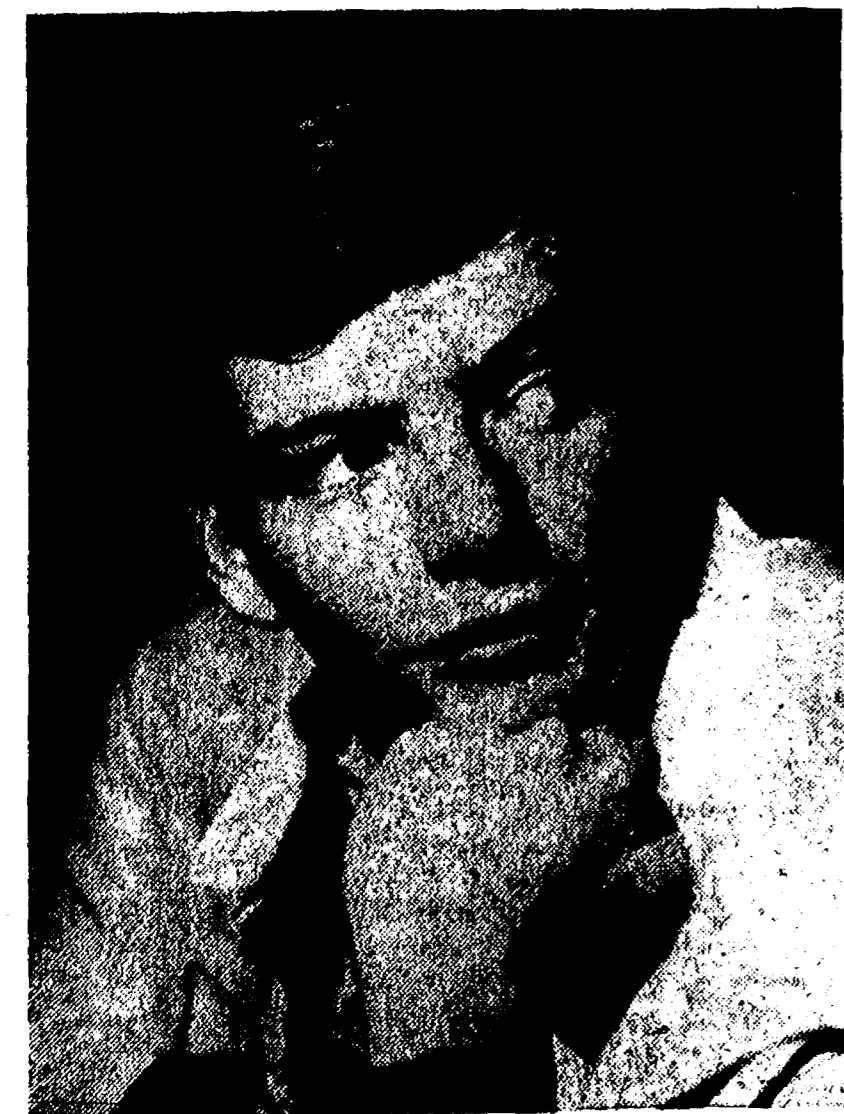

Judge Finley, 60, suffered an apparent heart attack Wednesday at his home, 1717 Earlmount, and was dead on arrival at Beaumont Hospital.

A BERKLEY resident for 18 years, Judge Finley had served as city attorney before becoming judge 10 years ago. He was referee of the Oakland County Juvenile Court, past president of the Oakland County Bar Association and the Berkeley Chamber of Commerce, active in many civic and charitable organizations.

Surviving are his wife, Bernadene; two children, Daniel J. and Mrs. George (Gail) Reeves; his mother, Mrs. Myrtle Finley; and one grandchild.

SIX INDIVIDUALS in the Ferndale-Pleasant Ridge area are being helped in the Ann Arbor birth defect center.

City Clarifies Positions on Chesterfield Paving

Chesterfield residents, between Hilton and Fair, will meet with City Commissioners Monday to determine whether they will have a concrete or blacktop street.

The public hearing Dec. 13 was invalid because it was not advertised.

Although the meeting could not be treated as a legal formal hearing, commissioners listened to comments of homeowners present and said they will consider them when making the decision.

The proper advertising appeared in last week's Ferndale Gazette-Times and the hearing will be formally completed Monday.

ROY F. GOODSPEED, director of the Department of Public Works, has recommended paving the street. The present surface is a spray coat of asphalt over gravel, which requires constant maintenance, he said.

Some property-owners have concurred. Mrs. John V. Cairns of 560 East Chesterfield, circulated a petition asking for concrete. Since that time however, some who signed have changed their minds and now favor black top, said Mrs. Cairns.

The objections to paving seem to fall into three major categories: the cost to each homeowner, the condition of the water mains and the rumored threat that the area will become industrial.

If the commission votes in favor of concrete, residents will be assessed \$7 per front foot for installation.

RESIDENTS complained that they have had a series of water-main breaks and that their street has repeatedly been torn up.

Originally constructed in 1934, a portion of the main was found to be badly pitted from underground acids and was replaced in 1960.

Three breaks have been reported and repaired since then. The estimated cost of completely replacing the main would be in the neighborhood of \$10,000 and three breaks wouldn't warrant that cost, according to Goodspeed.

City Manager J. William Little explained, "We believe the breaks were caused by shifting of the ground after construction of the 12-Town Drain."

He added, "I hope the ground has not completely settled. I feel the main is in good condition and should not have an abnormal number of breaks."

He recommended the installation of the pavement without replacing the main.

ALL MAINTENANCE of water mains is provided by the city out of water revenues.

NINE ice rinks are being flooded this year.

Six will be on Magic Squares located at Harding, Mapledale, Roosevelt, Taft, Wanda and Wilson Parks. They will have cement or asphalt for a base. The other three, Breckenridge at Bermuda, Martin Road Park and Washington School will have clay bases.

Weather permitting, supervisors are on the rinks from 4 to 5:30 and 7 to 9:30 p.m. Mondays through Fridays.

The week-end schedule has supervised skating from 10 a.m. to noon Saturday and from 1 to 5:30 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

Hockey is permitted on all rinks each Monday, Wednesday and Friday evening from 8 to 9:30 p.m. and Saturday and Sunday mornings through 1 p.m.

MAYOR Bruce Garbutt felt: "You can check any city in this area and you'll find they'll have water main breaks. They can't always be avoided, especially in colder weather. There is no water system in northern areas I know of where there aren't breaks."

Goodspeed added, "The number of breaks in Ferndale are not unusual compared with Detroit and Royal Oak."

Mayor Garbutt also reassured homeowners that the area west of Fair will be single residence in the master plan, if adopted in its present form.

SOME RESIDENTS felt the city wanted to convert the area along Hilton from Eight Mile to the track crossing to industrial use.

At the Commission meeting, Little retorted, "That's a misunderstanding due to inaccurate reporting. I wondered if we were at the same meeting when I read it next day."

A resident spoke up, "And I've seen no retraction."

(This paper has known since the Oct. 20 presentation of the proposed zoning order that the city rather is considering industrial use in the triangle formed by Eight Mile, Fair and the track—and has never reported otherwise.)

Even if this small triangle should be rezoned for industry, truck traffic could not be diverted to Chesterfield.

Garbutt said, "Trucks over 3 1/2 ton may not travel residential streets unless making deliveries on those streets."

A complete plan for adults from first grade through senior high is available. All business courses will be increased from two to three hours and can be taken for high school credit. In addition, some college courses are presented.

NEW CLASSES are designed to give more complete coverage in all areas. New from the University Center of Adult Education will be four classes on college level, but

it is not necessary for a student to be enrolled in a college or university to take them.

"This gives a person a marvelous opportunity to try his wings without needing to qualify for entrance into a regular college program," said Mrs. Dorothy Kosovac, adult educational director.

All four classes were chosen to interest especially the working man or woman who wants to upgrade his skills or add dimension to his life.

Two University of Michigan credit courses will be offered, "Personality Development" and "Indians of North America," a two-credit anthropology course.

BECAUSE the community has shown such interest in creative arts, the scope of that program has been increased by a new class for beginners, "Drawing," from 7 to 9 p.m. Tuesdays.

Designed to stimulate and develop the students' creative abilities with various media, it is being offered to residents for a fee of \$7, to non-residents for \$8.

Judge Warns of New Year Traffic Peril

One of the most dangerous week ends of the year, traffic-fatality wise, will start this Friday.

The celebration of New Year's will start on the same day.

This tragically ironic twist to what should be a happy occasion for all is reflected in figures of the National Safety Council and the Michigan State Police.

These show that, year after year, the New Year holiday weekend results in more deaths on the highways than the Fourth of July or Labor Day. Last year the National Safety Council estimated that 800 persons died in the nation as a result of accidents on the three-day New Year weekend.

The Traffic Safety Association points out that the New Year's Eve period is generally the most dangerous of all. And, perhaps, the greatest reason is persons who drink to excess and then drive.

MUNICIPAL JUDGE Montague R. Hunt has stated that, no matter how seriously the Court treats traffic violators with fines and jail, the punishment can never ease the grief of an accident-injury occurring during the holiday season, or at any time.

The judge also stated that the tragedy of holiday fatalities can only be avoided by every driver's care, caution and sobriety.

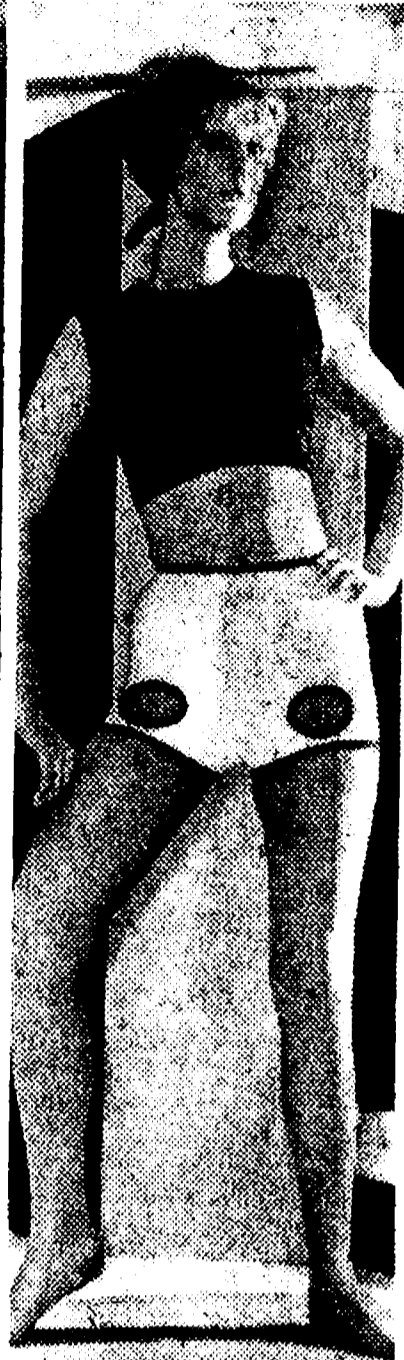

PEEK PERFORMANCE—Sue Gunn models a funster foundation garment created by Texas-born Paris designer Ruben Torres. It's part of his spring collection.



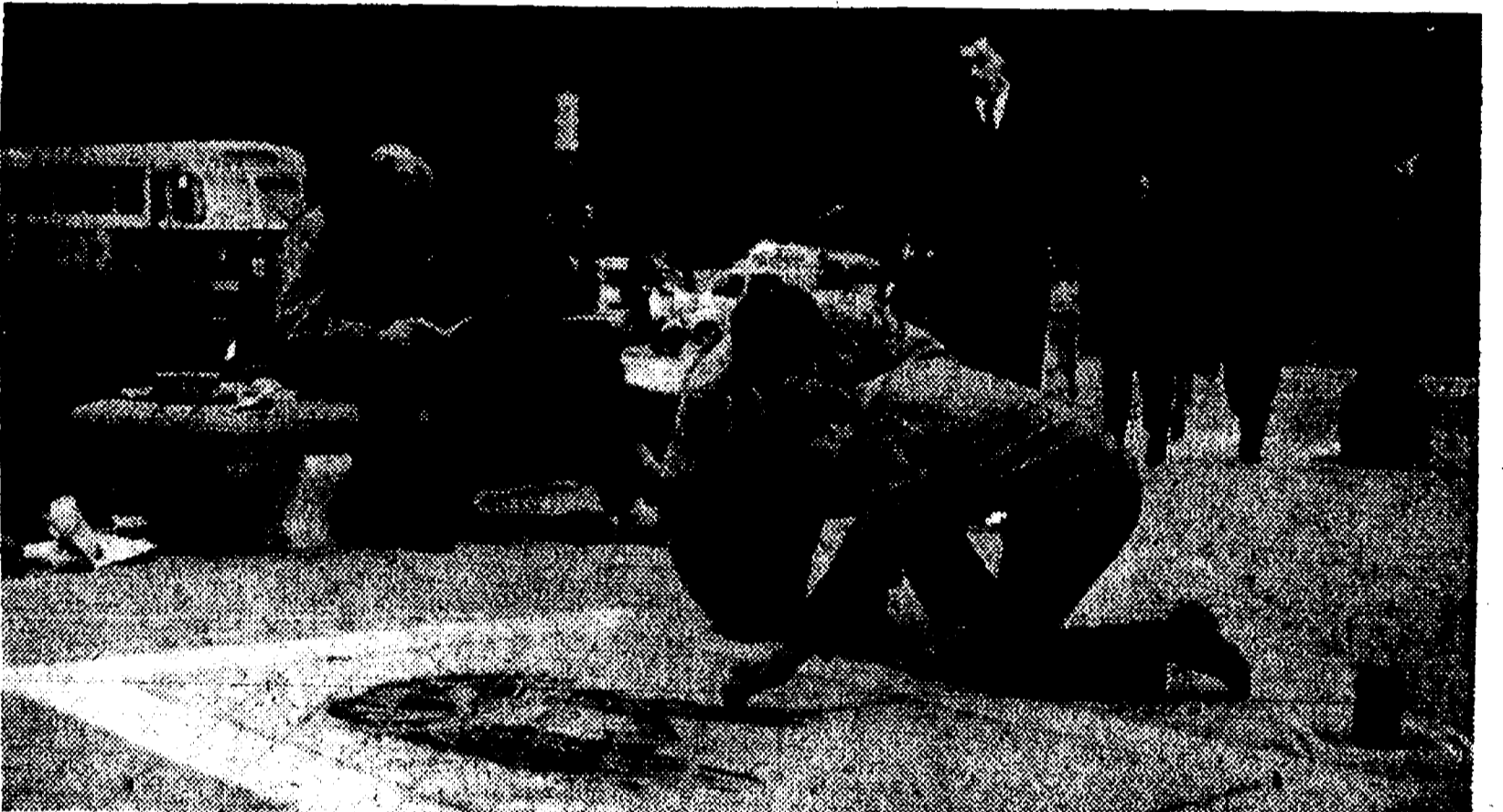

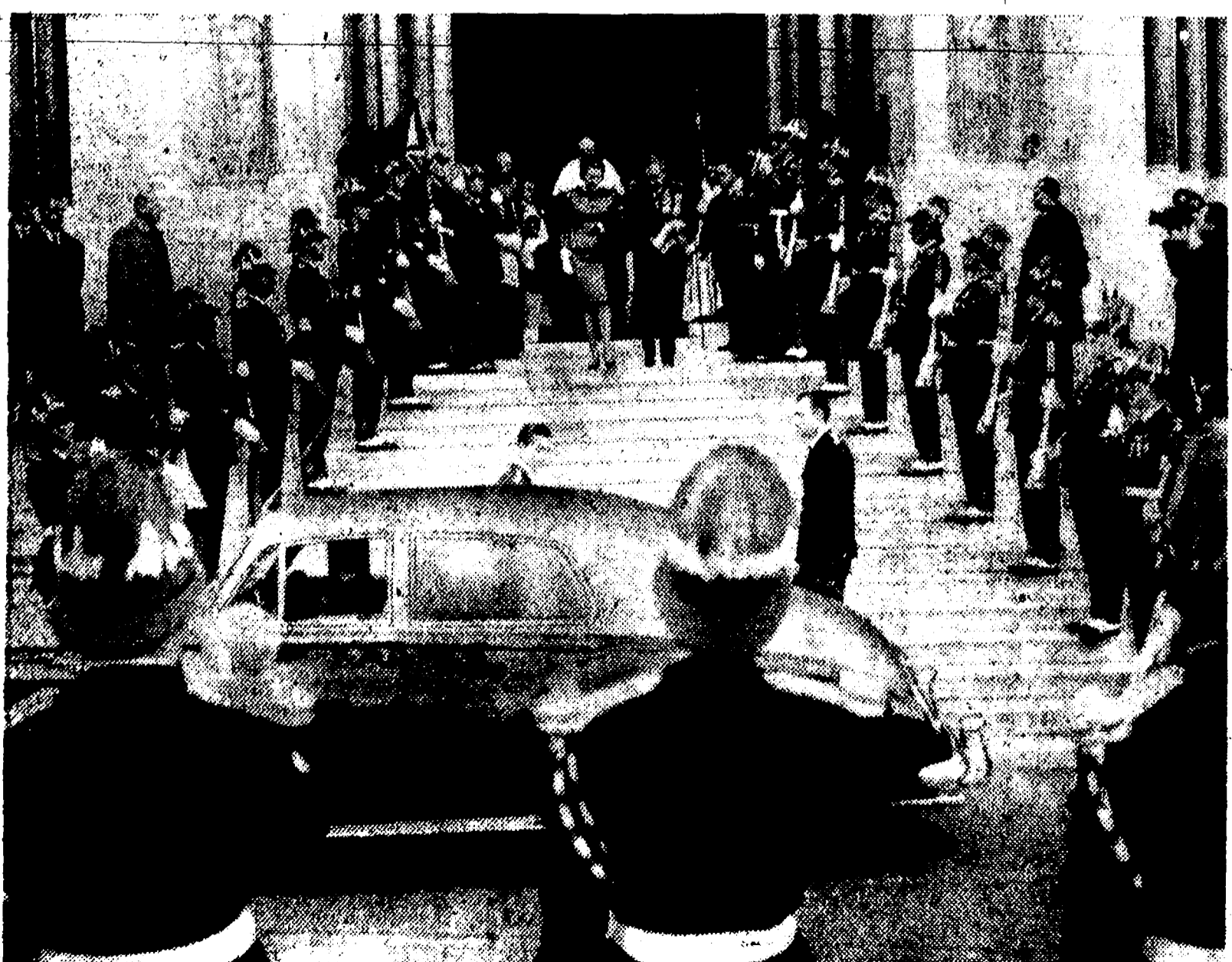
